Coercive control as a criminal offence, and its impact on and interrelationship with family law proceedings

The session will cover the particularisation of the 'new' offence, and the role 'culture' may play in the prosecution and/or defence of a coercive control charge. It will also look at the importance of family law cases in the area of coercive control, namely, but not limited to, *Morton & Beatty* [2022] FedCFamC2F 784, *Gadhavi & Gadhavi* [2023] FedCFamC1A 117, and *Ramzi & Moussa* [2022] FedCFamC2F 1473, as well as evidence gathering across both criminal and family jurisdictions.
