Busting the trust: When are trust assets available for distribution in a family law proceeding?

In a series of cases, and most notably the landmark High Court decision in *Kennon v Spry* [2008] HCA 56; (2008) CLR 366, courts have found that, in certain circumstances, trust property can constitute 'property of the parties to the marriage' for the purpose of \$79 of the *Family Law Act 1975* (Cth). Through detailed case studies, the presenters aim to elucidate key concepts and arm practitioners with the necessary knowledge to guide them through this often complex, and quickly evolving, area of family law practice.
