Combustible cladding: The latest law and likely developments

Fires in high rise towers (including the Grenfell Tower in London and Lacrosse in Melbourne) have brought notoriety to a popular façade finish known as aluminium composite panels ('ACP'), and have seen legislative and regulatory amendment introduced in most states to prohibit the use of so-called 'combustible cladding'. This has also seen building owners question the design and approvals process whereby such cladding was permitted and used in the buildings' construction. Inevitably, litigation has ensued, with architects, engineers, certifiers, suppliers, subcontractors and head contractors the typical targets. The presenter will discuss these issues, the recent authorities that have considered them, and the implications for property owners.
